

Our toolbox includes media - radio, television, films and magazines; mediation and facilitation; training and coaching; work with community organisations; sports; drama; and music.



SEARCH FOR COMMON GROUND IN NEPAL

SFCG has been working in Nepal since 2006 with the overall objective *to support the peace process.* Using the common ground approach with youth, civil society organisations, media, and other key stakeholders, SFCG works with local partners to:

- Increase local ownership and participation in the transition to peace and democracy;
- Involve multiple stakeholders, particularly those who have been traditionally marginalized, in democratic processes at local and national levels;
- Strengthen inter-communal relations across ethnic, caste, geographical, and political lines; and
- Promote reconciliation to reweave the fabric of society that has been torn apart by war.

"WE DECIDED TO ORGANISE A PEACE MARCH ON 26TH JANUARY, 2009. THE PARTICIPATION WAS SURPRISINGLY OVERWHELMING; ELDERS WERE EXCITED, THEY CAME FORWARD IN ORGANISING. THERE WERE APPROXIMATELY 400 PEOPLE, WHICH INCLUDED MADHESHI, PAHADE, MUSLIMS AND MANY OTHER MINORITY GROUPS. WOMEN AND CHILDREN ALSO CAME FORWARD TO JOIN HANDS WITH US. DISPLAYING PLACARD, CHANTING SLOGANS OF PEACE, AND PLAYING PEACE SONG IN THE BACKGROUND, IT REMINDED ME THAT THERE IS HOPE IN THIS COMMUNITY TO SURVIVE PEACEFULLY. I FELT THE TIME AND ENERGY INVESTED TO BRIDGE THE GAP BETWEEN YOUTH AND ADULT HAS BEEN SUCCESSFUL."

PROGRAMMES

SFCG Nepal's approach is to combine media and communication campaigns with community peacebuilding. The media programs, which have nationwide reach, thus reinforce the work of peacebuilders at the local level. Community peacebuilding programmes focus on sixteen districts including Dang, Salyan, Rolpa, Rukum, Jumla, Bardiya, Kailali, Doti, Accham, Barjura, Surkhet, Sankhuwasabha, Siraha, Saptari, Dhanusha and Mahottari.

MEDIA PROGRAMMES

Using methodologies which have been tried and tested in conflict zones throughout the world, SFCG uses media programs to encourage solution-oriented dialogue, cooperative problem solving, and foster new models of participation and leadership. In partnership with Antenna Foundation Nepal, New World, Far Western Media Development Centre and FM stations across the country, we support the production of original radio dramas, talkshows, magazine programs and television drama.

Our programs include: Naya Baato, Naya Paila (New Path, New Footprints), a radio soap opera broadcast nationally about the role of youth in peacebuilding, Sunau Bolau (Let's Listen, Let's Talk), a program produced by children from diverse backgrounds and designed to give children a voice (AFN); F (Wider Earth), a franchised radio talk show with both regional and local versions, which aims to strengthen interethnic cooperation and dialogue on issues of concern to people in marginalised communities (NW, FMDC, various FM stations); Sangor, an innovative weekly radio drama in Maithili (NW); and Sajhedari, a radio magazine focusing on improving relations between local government and citizens(NW/ NGCPP).2010 will also see the launch of a TV drama 'The Team', part of a 10 country initiative that uses football to promote good governance, cooperation and inclusive leadership.

MEDIA FOR PEACEBUILDIN

Journalists can play a key role reducing violence and promoting peace in times of transition and conflict. SFCG runs a comprehensive training and coaching program that equips radio producers, presenters and journalists across the country with skills to produce programs or articles that promote non violent problem solving.

COMMUNITY PEACEBUILDING

SFCG Nepal is working with a range of key stakeholders at the community level, including leadership development of youth, capacity building of civil society and supporting the return and reintegration of Children Associated with Armed Forces and Armed Groups. The community programmes compliment and reinforce the messages from our media programmes.

Our community programmes include **Youth Leadership Development for Community Peacebuilding** which identifies "multiplier youth" from diverse communities, brings them into a dialogue and leadership development process and provides support for youth-led organisations to implement peacebuilding activities at the local level. Civil society-capacity **building on peacebuilding** builds the capacities of civil society organisations to develop conflict transformation and youth focussed programs.

PEACE SONG

"Now on my heart, I write New Nepal"

In the year leading up to the 2008 democratic elections, Nepal's peace process hung in the balance. Ethnic, political, and communal clashes were common as agitating organisations took advantage of the power vacuum to increase their position at the table.

Four months before the elections, SFCG and partners worked with renowned Nepali folk music band Kutumba to create a peace song. Ex-combatants from both sides of the conflict, current leaders of political and agitating organisations, peacemakers, and the famous poet and lyricist Viplob Pratik were invited to participate in a dialogue process to discuss what needed to happen for Nepal to come to peace.

As the dialogue process took place hostilities between the various groups dissolved, and the workshop resulted in two songs that wove the musical traditions of the various ethnic groups of Nepal together into a unified call for peace. Two weeks before the elections the songs were performed to a packed house in Kathmandu and broadcast on national radio and TV.
